President's Update

The event in the spotlight this month is **Nature Spirituality Alliance Day on September 26** at the Appalachian South Folklife Center near Pipestem State Park. Everyone who holds nature and the environment sacred and respects varied spiritual paths is welcome. The last page of this month's newsletter has full information with a schedule for NSA Day. A **Membership Orientation** is being developed and is tentatively set for **October 17**. Those considering choosing Unitarian Universalism as their faith tradition and our Fellowship as their spiritual home are encouraged to inquire about the orientation. Treasurer's Report

As promised, this is a partial look at where our money went this past fiscal year (July to June). Our biggest single grouping was our Reserves category. (By "Reserves," I mean I set aside money every

month to cover expenses in these categories, as opposed to paying as the expenses come up.) We spent \$1,750 on speakers this past year (primarily Kelly Kaufman) and \$1,452 on Maintenance expenses. Insurance for both 911 Kanawha and 312 Maxwell Hill was \$1,027, and charity contributions to Helping Hands and Pine Haven were \$460. Rental income and property taxes on the Maxwell Hill property were \$498 (which we have to pay even though we are a church, because it is not our church sanctuary). For Lay Leadership, we spent \$569 (Summer Institute primarily). Our two final Reserves categories were our obligations to the UUA (\$882) and the OMD (\$441). Thus, the total Reserves expenses were \$7,079, or 33.6% of all the money we spent last year. Next month, we'll continue to look at last year's expenses. As always, if you have any questions on this, please let me know! *Cathy Abernathy, Treasurer*

Nature Spirituality Alliance Day

September 26, 2009

Where: Appalachian South Folklife Center in Summers County near Pipestem State Park just off Rt. 20 between Athens and Hinton.

Time: From 9:00 a.m. to just after sunset.

Events: Speakers and presenters will share their expertise on topics related to alternative spiritualities, environmentalism, and sustainable living. Also, there will be children's activities, Neo-Pagan and Native American ritual, live music, possible drumming circle, vendors, beautiful outdoor setting, networking, fellowship and fun.

The purpose of the Nature Spirituality Alliance Day (NSAD) is to hold an annual event in the Southern Appalachian Mountains that focuses on the parallel themes of Nature and Spirituality. The NSAD will serve as a gathering event for folks who feel a deep sense of awe and wonder at all the beauty and mysteries of nature and who seek inner development and spiritual growth.

This is a welcoming and safe family- and children-friendly event where spiritual beliefs and experiences can be shared. Activities will facilitate opportunities for people to learn about alternative Earth-Centered Spiritualities, to form groups or networks of kindred spirits, and explore ways to honor and protect our environment and the planet which gave us life.

A tentative schedule follows:

10:00 A.M. **Opening Ritual**, "Past and Future," presented by Gavin and Yvonne Frost.

1:00 P.M. **Alternative Spiritualities** presented by Al Youmans, Chief of the New River UU Pagan Circle.

3:00 P.M. **Spiritual Practice Round Table**, moderated by Al Youmans. This will be an open forum for leaders from any Spiritual Path (Pagan, Abrahamic, Buddhist, Eastern, or other) and others who may simply want to learn about alternative and orthodox spiritual paths, where we can share our beliefs, network, and possibly plan future events or invite folks to join us.

4:00 P.M. **Wicca 501**, presented by Gavin and Yvonne Frost.

6:00 P.M. **Chocolate Ritual**, presented by Ron Walks With Fire and Raven.

7:00 P.M. **Closing Ritual** to ask for the healing of the planet, led by Torula Chanlett-Avery, a local leader from the Reclaiming Witchcraft Tradition. There will be a modest bonfire with this ritual.

Planned children's activities will last all afternoon and will be organized and supervised by experienced teachers.

There is no fee for this event but voluntary donations will be solicited to defray costs and to go toward planning next year's event. Signs on Rt. 20 near Pipestem State Park will direct people to the event. It is uncertain whether food vendors will be at the event, so attendees should plan to bring their own food and drink for the day. Professional security is also being provided at the event. No alcohol or weapons are allowed.
